

Networker Cookie Policy

What Networker stores in your browser, why, and how to control it

Effective Date: August 21, 2026

1. Scope

This Cookie Policy explains how Networker uses cookies and similar browser storage on trynetworker.com and in the Networker workspace. It supplements the Networker Privacy Policy, which governs how personal information is handled generally. Where this policy and the Privacy Policy overlap, both apply.

Cookies are small text files that a site stores in your browser. Similar technologies include local storage and session storage, which work the same way for the purposes of this policy. Where this policy says 'cookies', it means all of these.

2. The Short Version

Networker uses strictly necessary cookies only. We do not use advertising cookies, retargeting pixels, social media tracking pixels, fingerprinting, or any cross-context behavioral advertising technology.

Networker does use a third-party product analytics provider, PostHog, and we want to be precise about it rather than hide it in a list. PostHog is configured so that it stores nothing at all in your browser: no cookie, no local storage, no session storage. It measures which pages are opened and a small set of named product actions, and it keeps that measurement in memory for the length of the page visit only. It does not record your screen, build heatmaps, capture the text of what you click, read your browser console, or measure page performance; each of those is switched off both in our code and in the provider's own project settings. Because nothing is written to your device, it does not set a tracking cookie and cannot follow you to any other site.

Because Networker sets no non-essential cookies, there is no consent banner to click through and nothing to opt out of. If that ever changes, we will publish a consent mechanism and update this policy before setting any non-essential cookie.

3. Cookies Networker Sets

Authentication and session cookies. Set by our authentication provider to keep you signed in, to refresh your session securely, and to protect against session theft. These are required. Blocking them prevents sign-in entirely.

Mailbox authorization cookies. Short-lived cookies that record that you have started connecting a mailbox, which provider you chose, and where to return you when the authorization finishes or is cancelled. They expire quickly and are cleared once the flow completes.

Security and abuse-prevention cookies. Used to validate that a state-changing request came from Networker rather than another site, and to apply rate limits that protect accounts and recipients.

Preference storage. Browser storage used to remember interface choices such as a selected view, filter, or dismissed notice, so the workspace behaves consistently between visits.

None of these cookies are used to access, read, or index your connected mailbox content, and none are shared with advertisers or data brokers.

4. Third-Party Requests

Networker embeds no third-party advertising scripts. It does load the PostHog analytics library described in Section 2, which sends measurement data to PostHog and stores nothing in your browser. Some pages also load resources directly from other providers, and your browser makes those requests itself.

School and company icons on marketing and database pages may be requested from public icon services operated by Google and DuckDuckGo. The demo booking control opens a scheduling page hosted by Google Calendar. Payment pages are hosted by Stripe. Sign-in screens are hosted by Google, Microsoft, and our authentication provider, and Gmail mailbox authorization is hosted by Composio.

Those providers see your IP address, your browser details, and the fact that a request was made. They receive no account, workspace, or mailbox content from Networker. Any cookies they set are governed by their own policies, not this one. Payment and sign-in providers may set cookies necessary to complete those flows and to detect fraud.

5. Legal Basis and No Sale of Data

For users in the European Economic Area and the United Kingdom, the cookies described in Section 3 are strictly necessary for a service you have requested, so they do not require consent under the ePrivacy rules. We do not rely on consent for cookies because we set none that require it.

The ePrivacy consent rules govern storing information on, or reading information from, your device. Our analytics provider does neither, so those rules are not engaged by it. The measurement data it does collect is still personal data under the GDPR, and we process it on the basis of our legitimate interest in understanding how the product is used and in finding errors. To keep that collection to what the purpose actually needs, the provider is configured to discard your IP address at collection, after using it to derive an approximate location, and measurement events are deleted after twelve months. You can object to that processing at any time by emailing support@trynetworker.com, and you have the rights set out in the Privacy Policy.

Under the California Consumer Privacy Act as amended, Networker does not sell personal information and does not share personal information for cross-context behavioral advertising. We honor legally required opt-out preference signals such as Global Privacy Control where applicable and technically feasible.

Do Not Track browser signals have no agreed standard meaning. Because Networker performs no tracking across sites, a Do Not Track signal does not change what we do.

6. Your Controls

You can view, block, and delete cookies through your browser settings, and most browsers offer a private browsing mode that discards them at the end of a session.

Blocking or deleting Networker's necessary cookies will sign you out and will prevent sign-in, mailbox connection, and checkout from working. There is no way to use an authenticated account without them.

Signing out of Networker clears your session. Deleting your account removes account records as described in the Privacy Policy.

7. Changes and Contact

We will update this policy if our use of cookies changes, and the effective date above will change with it. Material changes will be described in the Privacy Policy as well.
